THE FIRST HBSU IN STATE OF MAHARASHTRA

The Government of Maharashtra has established the Dr. Homi Bhabha State University, as a Cluster University, with the Institute of Science, Mumbai; Elphinstone College, Mumbai; Sydenham College, Mumbai; and Secondary Training College, Mumbai, as the Constituent Colleges. The Institute of Science, Mumbai is the Lead Institute of the University. The University is an independent degree granting entity with its own Rules and Regulations. This is the first University of its kind in the State of Maharashtra. It will generate contemporary and relevant infrastructure and provide undergraduate and post-graduate programmes in diverse disciplines under choice based credit system (CBCS).

Some of the special features of this university are:

- -All the colleges are elite colleges, are in existence for a long time, and with heritage mark.
- -The colleges are Government Colleges and hence the fee structure will be regulated and reasonable.
- -The students can opt for skill based courses.
- -The students can avail the expertise and facilities of the colleges in the cluster.
- -The assessment of the students will be through continuous and end semester examinations.
- -Enrichment lectures by outside experts will be arranged.
- -Selected students can do internship and projects.
- -Placement and training facilities will be provided.

Forming its own University will enable the College to introduce several industry connect and upto date programs which would make the students Job Able and Entrepreneurs. Wish the College the very best regards.


Our alumni CA. Shri Pandit Snehal Muzoomdar's take on Sydenham forming a cluster University


The passing percentage of Sydenham college for the year 2020 is 98.57%



The COVID 19 pandemic is an ongoing global pandemic of coronavirus disease 2019, caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2(SARS-CoV-2)

This virus spreads between people in close contact mostly via small droplets which are produced by coughing, sneezing or talking and also spreads when people touch contaminated surfaces and then touch their face. The symptoms include fever, cough, fatigue, shortness of breath and loss of smell and taste. Sometimes complications include pneumonia and acute respiratory distress syndrome.

Some preventive measures that individuals can take include washing your hands regularly, wearing a face mask while stepping out of your house, maintaining social distancing at all times, and disinfecting surfaces.

The first coronavirus case was identified in India on 30th, January in Kerala. After this case, the Indian government issued an advisory for the citizens. The government decided to impose a complete nationwide lockdown of all non essential goods, services and activities. During the entire cycle of the lockdown the entire economy was on a standstill. This led to huge financial losses to various businesses and it drastically impacted the GDP of India.

But the lockdown has hit the daily wage earners, migrant workers and casual laborers the hardest. This section faced many challenges as for them, no work meant no bread. Many of them who had come to metropolitan cities in the search of work decided to return back to their home towns and the inadequacy of transport facilities made most of them walk on foot.

The pandemic also has an impact on students across the country and has had a major impact on education and examinations. Also most schools and colleges have switched to online teaching and tests and are thus coming up with new alternatives to combat the crisis.


The 50 years reunion of the


and it was indeed a special day for three of them who celebrated their birthdays. So we had the luxury of three cakes for the birthday girls.

Reunion of the Class of 1970 was extraordinary, and we have promised to hold another reunion soon.




