6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- The College follows syllabus prescribed by Board of Studies of University of Mumbai.
- Our professors attended & participated in workshop for revised syllabus and actively gave their suggestions for framing syllabus according to the changing needs.
- Two professors of our college have published textbooks for MHRD & Export Marketing for T.Y.B.Com Class.
- Similarly few of our professors are paper setter & evaluator of MPSC exam.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Students are encouraged to give projects & presentations on various subjects.
- Along with regular chalkboard teaching, professors also use case studies, relevant examples, role play, discussions, news paper cutting, debates, quiz to make the learning more interesting.
- Industrial visits, visit to financial institutions and bank, are organised to give broader understanding of the finance related subject.
- Chartered Accountant who are teaching in our college provided opportunities to student to work as intern during vacation to give them practical knowledge in the subject of accountancy.
- Surprise test and project work were given for students to check their understanding of the subject.
- The nature club society of our college had organised one day visit to National Park to give broader idea in the subject of EVS.
- SAEMO society had organised one day event on HOW TO MAKE CREATIVE AD related to the subject of Advertising of SYBCOM.
- Regular meeting are organised by principal with teaching staff to discuss quality teaching methods.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Exam conducted on behalf of Mumbai University. College conducts First Year and Second Year Exams. Third Year and M.Com. Exams are conducted by University of Mumbai.

- 1. Examination of F.Y.B.Com, & S.Y.B.Com, was divided in to first term Syllabus for 50 Marks & Second term Syllabus for 50 Marks.
- 2. Subject like foundation course was having project of 20 Marks.
- 3. Business communication, Maths & Statistics have tutorials of 10 Marks.
- 4. ATKT Exam. Conducted of 100 Marks for failure student in October & March every year.
- 5. T.Y.B.Com & M. Com I & II Exam. are of 100 Marks each conducted in March/April every year.
- 6. Examination of BBI and BMS was divided in two semesters for every year of 100 Marks (60 Marks for Theory + 40 Marks for Internal).
- 7. Masking of answer sheets is done and code numbers are given. Moderation and Revaluation is done, Photocopy of assessed answer sheet is given to students who asks for its revaluation if desired.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Prof. Manoj Devne was awarded minor research project in the subject of Geography.
- Professor is encouraged presented papers in international and national conference.
- College reimbursed the registration fees to the staff who attended conference and seminars.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

College had tied up with Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra open University (YCMOU) to conduct oral coaching centre for students appearing for UPSC & MPSC examinations. This facility was also provided to the other college students as well.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Casual leave, sick leave and other leave were granted as per the government policy.
- Salaries were given to staff on time, which was a motivating factor.
- Women staff was supported during pregnancy.
- Efforts are always made to maintain cordial and friendly relation with all staff members.

Industrial visit was arranged for the BMS students at Coca-Cola, Wada for better understanding of the handling of the company's operation at it's bottling plant. The students got an idea about the work culture, plant layout, and organisational structure. The HR Manager of the company explained the incentives given to the workers to meet the targets in time. This leads to increase in overall productivity & efficiency of the company.
