6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum for Bcom, BBI, BMS, MCOM is prescribed by University of Mumbai. Faculties participate in syllabus revision workshop and give theier constructive suggestions.

The syllabus NCCMP course is jointly designed by Sydenham College faculties and members from National Stock Exchange.

The syllabus for Vocational course in Foreign Trade is framed by Dr. Sunil Shete and Dr. Ritesh Kumar Singhal.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- 1. Practicals and tutorials session are also conducted to give more realistic exposure to the learner, for the subjects like Mathematics, Business Communication, and Computer Programming.
- 2. Slow learners are identified and they are given special coaching by our faculties
- 3. Faculties use various ICT tools for regular teaching to make lecture more effective and interesting for the students.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Exams are conducted on behalf of Mumbai University. College internally conducts First Year and Second Year Exams. Third Year B.Com, BBI, BMS and M.Com. Exams are conducted by University of Mumbai.

- 1. Masking of answer sheets is done. Coding method is adopted to ensure confidentiality of exam papers.
- 2. Writers for physically challenged and visually impaired students are provided by the college.
- 3. Centralised assessment programme (CAP) is adopted for paper assessment.
- 4. Moderation of answer books are done by professors of other colleges.
- 5. Rules regarding unfair means are displayed during examination period.

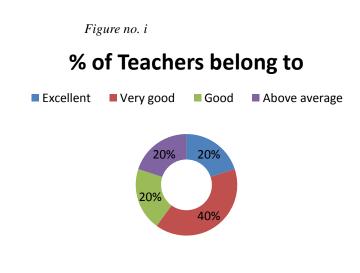

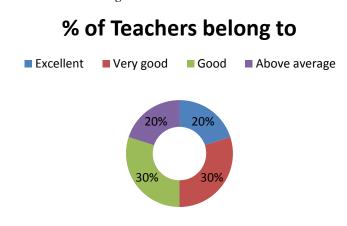

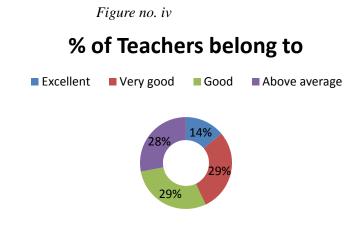

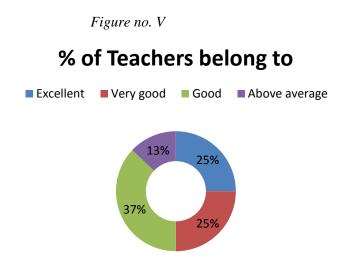

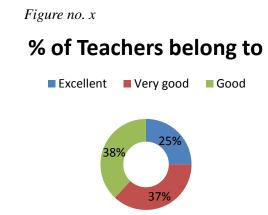

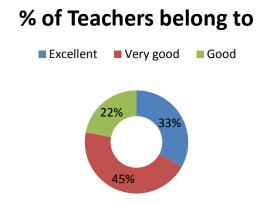
