Alumni Talks with With Mr. Dileep Chokshi

Sydenham Alumni Cell organized a session to interact and learn about one of the glorious Alumni of the college who has touched the greatest heights in his illustrious career.

From the Balance sheet of humanity to the Profit & Loss account of emotions, he is good in all books. Mr. Dileep Choksi is a rank holder at the intermediate and final examinations of chartered accountancy and has been in practice for more than 40 years. He advises some of India's large business houses on various strategic matters, including family succession and on wills and trusts. Mr. Choksi was the former Joint Managing Partner of Deloitte in India until 2008, before the setting up of C.C. Chokshi Advisors Pvt. Ltd. of which he is the Chief Mentor. Mr. Choksi is on the Board of well-known companies including as a member of their committees.

Mr. Choksi has contributed to various papers and has spoken at various seminars organized by the RBI, the ICAI, etc. He has also contributed to the preparation of Kanga and Palkhivala's - The Law and Practice of Income Tax (Eighth Edition) – the last edition written by the late Mr. N.A. Palkhivala and Mr. B.A. Palkhivala.

Here are some questions asked by students during the talk:

- 1. What are some cultural values that you learned as a child and still stick to them?
 - i. To respect each individual whether it be animals, people who are less fortunate in life, family members, business-associated, or friends.
 - ii. To always have an ideal in your life. Sir also explained that if at all you face any kind of problem try to think and act in the way your ideal would have acted, and if you do you will get an answer.
- 2. As we know you moved to commerce as your stream, what made you choose Sydenham for the same? Sydenham has always been an outstanding institution, the faculty was stupendous and if you want to make a career in commerce the best college for that was Sydenham.
- 3. If at the time when you were in college, would you have got an option between online and offline, what would you have chosen?

Offline college without any doubt because according to him Sydenham is a place where you go for overall development. It's not only the knowledge that you get out of books, it's the interaction with the professors and students. Taking part in sports activities, going to the library, interacting with friends. This contributes to your overall development which is not possible in an online college.

4. Time management today is a very important skill to master. How do you manage your time and make sure projects and your work stay on schedule?

To manage time and stay on schedule is very easy, set your goals straight and make sure to prioritize things to achieve these goals. Time has never been a constraint to anybody who has achieved great things in life.

5. As a professional, you must have had bad days. How did you overcome those?

According to Mr. Choksi, you should always give your best to anything that you do. Success isn't always in your hand all the time. Sometimes things don't go the way you plan they would but if you give your best you would have no regrets.

6. Many students here are going to give placement interviews this year so, what qualities do you look for in people when you recruit them to work with you?

Mr. Choksi looks for people who are honest and have strong moral principles and are good at teamwork. He also mentioned that when they call a candidate for a senior position, they make them wait for at least an hour to check how one reacts to this situation. After waiting for so long, and answering the question without any signs of irritation this shows the integrity of the person and how well of a team player he/she is.

7. As we know, you have worked for so many years now, How do you maintain a proper balance between your Professional and Personal life?

Always keep your Professional life out of your personal life and vice versa. It's simple: the things which are discussed and said in the office should not come home and your matters should not affect work. It's import ant to enjoy your time with friends and family and discussion about work makes the conversation boring, so it's best to keep professional and personal life separate to maintain a balance

8. Graduation is a very important phase in a person's life so according to you what are the things that one should be certain about while graduating keeping in mind the future goals?

"Be clear what you want in life" You should have your goal set in life and should work hard to achieve them. If you do so nothing is impossible.

9. What would you suggest to the younger genera tion about maintaining Personal finance?

Finance is the backbone on which everything rests because that's the only yardstick by which perfor mances are judged. Finance as a field over the years has grown tremendously, you should have their fundamentals clear and so you should have a very clear mind about which field you want to pursue in finance, there are a lot of fields to choose from and a lot of mechanization is also taking place as the introduction of artificial intelligence, machines have taken over.

10. Sir, your advice for today's youth.

To be very frank and honest there is a lot to learn

from our youth, this generation is a lot smarter than we were at their age, so according to me, I have a lot to take from this generation rather than giving.



The interaction with Mr. Choksi definitely created value in the lives of the students and gave us important lessons, which would go beyond textbooks and help us improve as an individual and build our skillset. The Relevance Of Mahatma Gandhi's Non-violence

"Have you heard of Gandhi? Do you know of him?" was a question asked of me frequently by my colleagues, as I traveled for work, in faraway countries like Brazil, Colombia, and Ecuador. Sure, as an Indian, I had known of the sterling role of Mahatma Gandhi in India's freedom struggle. However, I was amazed to see his fan following in distant countries, after the epic film, "Gandhi" by Richard Attenborough. The film, which won eight Oscars, took Gandhiji into the far corners of the world. I was also tickled that Richard Attenborough, a Britisher, had made the film, on a man who had spent almost his entire life fighting the British.

The 2nd October is the birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, the messiah of non-violence and a globally revered leader. He enshrined truth, in all his relations and politics. He proclaimed, "Truth is as old as the hills." His message of non-violence, is as relevant today, as it was in the 1930s and 1940s when he led the Indian freedom struggle. The means were as important as the ends, to Gandhi. As the greatest scientist Albert Einstein, "Generations to come will scarce believe that such a one as this ever in flesh and blood walked upon this earth."

In persuading the British to grant independence to India, Gandhiji followed a policy of non-violence. He asked all the freedom fighters to undertake peaceful resistance but never resort to violence against the police. There are times when he would call off a national struggle ("satyagraha") because some Indians indulged in violence. Every human life was precious for Mahatma Gandhi, even the lives of those who opposed India's quest for freedom. Those who respect human life, never indulge in violence. By following a policy of non-violence, Gandhiji appeal to the conscience of his opponents.



Mahatma Gandhi impacted the thinking of some global leaders also. Martin Luther King and Nelson Mandela were both followers of the non-violence philosophy of Mahama Gandhi. They enshrined his thinking of non-violence in their struggles, in their own countries.

Mahatma Gandhi spearheaded India's freedom struggle. However, he never became a pure politician. Gandhiji was involved in a political struggle but was guided by his spirituality. Gandhiji evoked respect from his opponents too. The British leaders knew that Gandhiji was a person of principles and was always above board. He meant what he said. He never had a hidden agenda.

Mahatma Gandhi never thought along religious lines. Gandhiji read the Bible, the Quran, and the Bhagwat Gita, with equal fervor. He noticed the commonalities in all the religions and advocated mutual respect. Throughout the freedom struggle of India, he involved the Muslims and Christians with equal fervor. Khan Abdul Ghaffar Khan and Maulana Azad were among his close associates, who struggled for India's freedom.



Gandhiji often proclaimed that he was not just a Hindu. He was a Hindu, Muslim, Christian, and Jew all rolled into one. His vision of India as a country, where people of all religions lived harmoniously.

Mahatma Gandhi was the greatest unifier of India. His heart broke at the partition of the country in 1947. He wanted the Hindus and Muslims to live together harmoniously. He was assassinated by extremists who were unhappy with his policy of appeasing the Muslims. Gandhiji gave his life for his dream of a united India.

Gandhiji practiced what he preached. If the Hindus and Muslims rioted, during the partition period, Gandhiji would personally go to reside in the afflicted localities and undertake a fast unto death, till peace was restored. If any Muslim children were orphaned, he would insist that some Hindu families should adopt them. Gandhiji never judged a man by struggles. Many of the embattled people, may not even have his religion, he focussed on the deeds of people.

Gandhiji practiced what he preached. In his "ashrams", (retreats, in which small communities lived by Gandhiji's teachings and principles), the residents had the responsibility of cleaning the toilets too. Traditionally, toilets in India were cleaned by a group of people who were considered "untouchables." Gandhiji was against any discrimination. He respected all forms of work. So, in his "ashrams" people cleaned all toilets by rotation. As Gandhiji said, "Be the change you want to see in the world".

Gandhiji's autobiography, "My Experiments with Truth", is written with absolute candor, in simple, basic English, which everyone can understand. It should be made a mandatory textbook for school children. It is important to expose youngsters to leaders, who ushered significant changes in our world, without any violence or firing a single shot from a gun.

Younger generations would also benefit by reading "The Life of Mahatma Gandhi" by the American author, Louis Fischer. This book was my Bible, in my younger days. It is the best book on Gandhiji, written in a very simple style. Fischer spent seven days with Gandhiji at Sevagram Ashram, in Wardha. The author was surprised to see that Gandhiji kept only a black and white picture of Jesus Christ, in his bare room.

> However, in most parts of the world, while Mahatma Gandhi is celebrated with statues and postage stamps, his message of non-violence is ignored.

The world over flows with armed struggles in Afghanistan, Palestine, Syria, Lebanon, etc. Armed militancy movements like Al Qaeda, ISIS in the Middle East, and rebel groups in Colombia and Peru have resulted in the death of thousands of people, in the name of ideological heard the name of Mahatma Gandhi. If the Palestinians deploy non-violence, it will attract global attention to their cause. The world needs to subordinate religion to economics.

Dussehra, also known as Vijayadashmi, is a major Indian festival that takes place on the tenth day of the Hindu calendar's Ashvin month. This day usually occurs in September or October, with this being on the 15th of October. In Hindu customs, the day marks the end of a nine-day fasting period known as Navratri. The immersion of Goddess Durga's motif also falls on this day.



The day commemorates Lord Rama's victory over the wicked Ravana. The slaying of the demon Mahishasur by Goddess Durga is also the reason for celebration. The Dussehra festival propagated the message of good triumphing over evil.

We are all familiar with the mythologies such as the

Yet another story connected with the origins of this day is the showering of gold coins. After Kautsa asked King Raghu for 140 million coins to be given as a present to his Guru in return for his knowledge and teachings, Raghuraja went to Indra for help who then asked Lord

Kuber to shower coins on the city of Ayodhya. After giving 140 million coins to his Guru, Kautsa circulated the remaining coins to the people who lived in Ayodhya.



Did you know, the festival of Dussehra is thought to have begun in the 17th century when the ruler of Mysore ordered a lavish celebration of the day. Since then,

the day has been commemorated with great zeal and vigor.

In both India and Bangladesh, the festival is widely observed. The city of Mysore has the well-known Dussehra most celebrations in India. Other well-known Dussehra celebrations in India include those in Kullu, Himachal Pradesh, Kolkata, and Orissa, where the festival lasts for a week. In many other areas of India, performances are organized throughout the cities representing the Ramayana story, which culminates in Ravana's death

on this day.

Memories are fresh of taking a 107 bus to the metro, getting off walking in the Bombay Hospital lane towards Liberty cinema to purchase tickets for a movie called Abhimaan. The year was 1973 it was a rainy day (heavy drizzle coming off and on) and me standing in the line at the booking counter...adorning my windcheater jacket hood on to purchase two tickets for the first-day first show screening 2 Balcony tickets yes it took forty minutes to reach the counter such was the craze of watching Amitabh Bachhan movies when he was rising to fame (and yet is the craze).

Construction work at our cinema began in 1947. Mr. Habib Hoosein was the owner and the name was derived from the Independence achieved by our country in that year. By 1949 the first film was released Andaz it was the first and the last movie when two evergreen stalwarts of Bollywood acted together Dilip Kumar and Raj Kapoor wooing the same gal Nergish. What a triangular affair. Brilliant acting by the trio. Those were the days of B/W films in the next 50 years to follow. Our theatre screened some of the biggest hits that Bollywood ever created. 1957 was the release of Mother India another Golden Jubilee and in the early nineties Bollywood was revived (yes Bollywood was as good as nonexistent from 1982 onwards no big stars hardly any releases Theatres were going empty) with the release of Hum Aapke Hain Kaun a movie which had a run of more than 3 years (after 2 years it ran during morning shows). And the show began again for Bollywood. Other super-duper hits released in our cinema (which I can recollect) were Nanak Haram, Upkaar (what a song kasme vade pyar wafa sab baatein hai baaton ka kya.....), Dharmatma, Kuch Kuch Hota Hai, Kabhi Khushi Kabhi Gham, Kal Ho Na Ho and many more super hits. Yes, Liberty was the only posh and royal theatre of SOBO showing Hindi movies. There were Capitol talkies (oldest theatre of Bombay) and Defence cinema (R.C. Church) but both were functional theatres. Go in time for the movie, sweat it out at times, buy snacks during intervals and rush back to your seat not interesting. We needed some more entertainment.

Liberty was a class apart theatre, it was a lavish five-storied building at the end of New Marine Lines open car parking area (on the side going towards Sasanian Restaurant), mini 30 seater preview theatre on the fifth floor (for trial shows and film journalists). Grand. Gold and Black Doors (theme color of Liberty) to enter whiff of A/c hitting you zooo.....zooo....ruffling your hairFlooring fully red-carpeted royal red color. Turn right about 10 meters ahead would be the softy carpeted staircase halfway through climbing, we would be confronted by a gigantic mirror where we all would peep to notice our appearances (wonder why we use to look directly at ourselves some things in life are never understood) turn left or Right climb further and destination reached. Well-spaced out the lobby, comfortable leather brown chairs (really relaxing) placed on the left-hand area, Canteen in the middle (mini canteen where even 20 people could sit and have their snacks) display windows of forthcoming attractions placed on the right-hand side and sofas placed all around there would also be two mini takeaway stalls at the left and right-hand side of the canteen (so friendly na). Photo frames hung on the walls of our veteran Film Stars.




Old ads of Coca Cola Tastiest chutney sandwiches to be relished & yes... yes....the Goan / Parsi preparation of sweet and hot chutney, piping hot Punjabi Samosa sold in brown packets before and during interval gold-en-brown crust melt in the mouth, potatoes no green peas slight garam masala, not spicy but Yummilicious just the way we enjoyed our favorite snack.

Dress Circle would be our preferred seating place either E row or F row.... Gangway seats were assured so we could stretch our legs. Spacious red-colored seat rich golden curtain going up at show timing...lights dimming every second advertisement slides begin ads takeover.....La la la la La la la la la.......followed by the Indian News documentary (time for a ciggy break and pick up snacks to munch) soon followed by their Forthcoming attractions (how we loved trailers)

Liberty, pink skin glowing in the sunlight, yellow hairband adorning silver trinkets on her forehead slight, very slight makeup & what innocent eyes. Feroze Khan singing " Kya khoob lagti ho..... badi sundar dikhti ho " Hema looking ravishingly stunning. Just loved her performing that song.

Parineeta and Namaste London ended our visits to our wondrous cinema. Both are good movies. Entertaining but it never crossed our mind it could be bye bye.....and the major plus point of visiting Liberty was relishing a meal at Balwas restaurant either before the 3 pm show or after the 6 pm show savor a creamy Butter chicken with roti.....kadak...kadak roti with butter floating on top of our orangish-red gravy, succulent tandoori pieces of chicken too tasty... followed up with a Chicken Biryani. Truly delectable preparation of saffron rice....marinated with a leg piece of chicken and eaten with sliced onions (circled).



Our gigantic screen had a unique background, on the left and right-hand side was a huge vertical rectangular Black and Golden pane. Black was the background and gold was the structural design of what we would describe as seats (so identical looking). Large gold seats are designed from below, the middle gold panel followed by a small gold panel, resembling opera theatre seats. Stamp of Royalty. Classy architecture. One can view these classy interiors in a film called Dil Chahta Hai... Saif Ali Khan and Sonali Bendre go for a movie at Liberty. The song is "Woh Ladki hai kahan" in just about 10 seconds flat a good Dekho of the screen, panels, and our red seats. (I am sure most of you all have viewed DCH).

If Hema Malini ever looked more beautiful than beautiful it was in Dharmatma viewed twice at

So delicious that we would wait in anticipation of our next release to Liberty to feast on our specialties of Balwas. Not knowing that the end would have come so soon (status yet unknown).

Art deco structure which began in 1933 with the opening of Regal cinema ended in 1949 when Liberty opened its doors to the public, 1200 seater theatre still standing status speculated by many no films to project some report will open soon. Could be an era of single-screen theatres that have come to an end.

In patriarchal societies, where men hold the control and make all the rules and women's rights and privileges are not spoken about which become a cause of their suffering and pain. Starting from female infanticide to gender inequality to sexual abuse, there is no dearth of issues. Thus, to curb this menace and to recognize girls' rights and the unique challenges girls face around the world, International Girl Child Day is observed every year on October 11.

The theme for this year is Digital generation. Our generation. As coronavirus lockdowns swept across the world, the fallout for girls came fast and hard. While the pandemic has accelerated digital platforms for learning, earning, and connecting, as per UNICEF, some 2.2 billion people below the age of 25 still do not have internet access at home in which girls are more likely to be cut off. The gender gap for global internet users grew from 11 percent in 2013 to 17 percent in 2019. In the world's least developed countries, it hovers around 43 percent.

The gender digital divide is about more than just connectivity. Moreover, girls are also less likely than boys to use and own devices and gain access to tech-related skills and jobs. Only by addressing the inequity and exclusion that span

INDIA



mental illnesses do not receive the care they are entitled to and need, and they, along with their family and caregivers, continue to be stigmatized and discriminated against.


